## FROM THE RECTOR'S WINDOW

Spring 2015

As I write, there's a touch of irony in the title of my column in the *Venerabile View* – because all that can be seen from the Rector's window is the scaffolding and the canvas that's been put in place so that the façades of the *cortile* can be cleaned and repainted. From September through to December we had scaffolding on the via di Monserrato, covering the whole of the street front of the College from the main entrance to the corner with via Montoro. The results are magnificent. It's almost worth a trip to Rome just to admire the new look. And if the *cortile* looks even half as good when it's finished, it will make all the pain worthwhile.

So when the new students arrived in Rome in September after their month of Italian study, they had to pick their way through the scaffolding to get into the College. Undaunted, they threw themselves into the task of settling into seminary life. There were eight new faces in all. Two were transferring from other major seminaries, one came from Valladolid and five were starting out. Deacon Kevin Athaide (Nottingham) joined us from Allen Hall in order to begin a licence in Biblical Theology. Mark Paver (Salford) had been studying for New York at the North American College in Rome, but he had asked to transfer to his native diocese and this meant switching seminary. Dominic Jenkinson (Hallam) had just completed the propaedeutic year in Spain. The other five were Alexander Balzanella (Westminster), Andy Clarke (Nottingham), Simon Jones and Matthew King (Portsmouth) and Piotr Wygnanski (East Anglia). This brought the total up to 40 resident seminarians – with Deacon Tony Rosso our one non-resident, as he was spending a semester in Florida to be close to his mother during her grave illness.

Many of the Friends will be sad to learn of the death of Carlo Benvenuti, who worked in the *portineria* for almost forty years. The last of his many services to the College came during the summer months while the College was virtually empty, when he arranged for the reupholstering of the sofas in the Student Common Room – last year's gift from the Friends of the Venerabile. He was very proud of the results. Sadly, by the time the students returned it was too late to thank him personally. His funeral took place on 22 September, and by a remarkable stroke of Providence, Cardinal Cormac was in Rome at the time. It was he who had first employed Carlo as porter on 1 January 1975 and it was fitting that he was able to preside at the Requiem Mass held in the College Church.



A week later, when all the students had returned, we set off on our pilgrimage to the Holy Land. This was made possible by the generosity of Pamela and Nicholas Coote, and we were delighted that Pam was able to join us. Our indefatigable guide, Fr Mervyn Tower, took us to Jerusalem for our first three nights, followed by two in Galilee. For many of us it was our first visit to the Holy Land and it was deeply moving to be able to celebrate Mass in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, the Garden of Gethsemane,

the Basilica of the Nativity, the Mount of the Beatitudes and the church on the shores of the Sea of Galilee associated with the events of John 21.



The Saturday coincided with the Jewish festival *Yom Kippur* and we had to ensure that we did not travel by coach during daylight hours. This gave us an unexpected opportunity for a rest on the Mount of the Beatitudes after our morning walk to Tabgha

and Capernaum, and by that stage we were ready for it. The whole experience has given a new dimension to our understanding of the Scriptures and it has brought to life many of the events we read about in the Gospels. We feel a deeper closeness to Our Lord now that we have walked where he walked and seen what he saw. Jerusalem, of course, has changed significantly since his time, but the Sea of Galilee with the surrounding hills must have looked very similar when he and his first disciples were there. For me one of the most moving moments was our boat ride on the Sea of Galilee early on the Sunday morning, our last day in the Holy Land. We were the only boat on the lake at the time. What a wonderful way to renew our commitment to “put out into the deep”!



Sadly, we weren't able to be present when Cardinal Vincent Nichols took possession of his titular church in Rome, Sant' Alfonso, as this happened while we were in Jerusalem.

But on our first Sunday back in Rome, we made a short pilgrimage to his church in order to dedicate the year to the Blessed Virgin with prayers before the icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Succour. We were delighted to be joined on this occasion by the Cardinal himself, as he had stayed on in Rome to take part in the Synod on the Family.

It is good to be able to welcome Father Martin Kelly onto the staff of the College. For two years he has been part of the community as a student priest and now, during the final year of his three year canon law licence, he has assumed the role of Pastoral Director, bringing the staff back up to five. Welcome, Father Martin! No sooner do we fill one vacancy, though, than another appears. Father Bruce had to return to the UK after Christmas, in order to be in a position to apply for British citizenship by the summer. His place has been taken, from January to the summer of 2015, by Monsignor Peter Fleetwood, an old friend of many of us in Rome, with years of experience of seminary formation. Welcome, Father Peter!

One of the significant projects that we are currently carrying forward concerns the College Archives. Like the work on the restoration of the façades, this has been made possible by the generosity of our great benefactors Urs and Francesca Schwarzenbach, who have been so good to the College over the years. Back in 2007, it was they who enabled us to rehouse the Archives in a secure location with top quality storage and conservation facilities. It was they, too, who funded the Schwarzenbach Fellowship, held in 2013 by Professor Maurice Whitehead of Swansea University and culminating in the fascinating lecture that he delivered in May 2014.

Professor Whitehead has just returned and is about to spend three years as Director of a new project aimed at bringing the catalogue up to modern professional standards and making it available online. We have long been conscious of the many hidden treasures in the College's historic archive and we look forward to exploring them further and opening them up to Catholic historians.

In accordance with tradition, the last day before the Christmas vacation saw some of our students admitted to candidacy. This year there were four: Philip Andrews (Southwark), Richard Howard (Salford), Peter Stoddart (Hexham and Newcastle) and Elliott Wright (Leeds). Presiding over the ceremony was Bishop Seamus Cunningham of Hexham and Newcastle. We keep the new candidates very much in our prayers as they commit themselves to the final stage of preparation for orders.

The end of January saw Rector and Vice-Rector setting off on a journey to Naples. No, I don't mean

*la bella Napoli* under the shadow of Vesuvius, but Naples in Florida, where Deacon Tony Rosso was ordained to the priesthood on Monday 2 February by Bishop Marcus Stock of Leeds. How many English College ordinations have taken place across the Atlantic, I wonder? This one was occasioned by the illness of Deacon Tony's mother. As she was unable to travel to Europe, we made the journey over there. *Ad multos annos*, Father Tony. We look forward to having you back with us for the second semester of this year, as you complete your licence in fundamental theology.

It remains only for me to thank all the Friends of the College for their support to us in so many ways. Your kindness and your prayers are greatly appreciated. Please continue to pray for vocations and for all our students.

### **A VEC Ordination in the Sunshine**

The feast of the Presentation of the Lord, February 2nd has always been one of my favourite celebrations in the church's calendar: the wonderful description of Mary and Joseph taking the baby Jesus, to Temple; their meeting with the prayerful souls of Simeon and Anna; the lighting and blessing of candles; a procession into church; and also, it just so happens to be my birthday! When I heard that one of our top year students, Tony Rosso was to be ordained as a priest on that day this year I was thrilled; an ordination to the priesthood is a wonderful celebration of Church and how appropriate for it to take place on the day we celebrate Christ being revealed a light for the peoples.

When you hear that the ordination took place in Naples you may imagine that we journeyed down the *autostrada del sole* a couple of hours south of Rome. However, Tony's family currently live in Naples, Florida, USA and it was there, in his home parish of St Agnes, in the diocese of Venice, that Tony was ordained on 2<sup>nd</sup> February. The ordination was arranged there to enable his mother, who had to cancel her trip to Tony's diaconate last July due to ill health, to be present at the ordination. Because it was during exam time in Rome, his fellow students were not able to make the journey, however the college was represented by the Rector and Vice Rector. As a student of Leeds diocese, Tony was delighted that the ordination was celebrated by his own, recently appointed ordinary, Bishop Marcus Stock, himself a former VEC student. The diocese of Leeds was also represented by the Vocations' Director, Mgr Paul Grogan, and three priests with whom Tony had been on parish placements, Fr Ian Smith, Fr John Aveyard and Fr Chris Angel. The VEC / Leeds presence was further increased by the presence of Fr Russell Wright who is currently serving in a parish in Florida.

The Parish and Church of St Agnes was founded just nine years ago but it is already a large and vibrant community. We received a very warm welcome from everyone, especially the Pastor, Fr Bob Cantor. It was the first ordination to the priesthood to take place in Naples and virtually the whole parish turned out join the celebration. It was estimated that almost 2000 people filled the church.

The ceremony was incredibly uplifting and beautifully celebrated by Bishop Marcus; his first ordination as a bishop. He related how he had visited the oldest priest in the diocese before he set off and asked what advice he should pass on to the newest priest in the diocese; "tell him to smile and be good ... and not to get into



any trouble with his bishop”, came the wise and amusing reply! The music was inspirational, led by the parish choir which numbers some ninety people. The full time music director of the parish is none other than Tony’s own father; it was remarkable to see him moving from leading the choir to sitting with the family to witness the rite of ordination. Tony’s family, his Mother and Father, two sisters and his brother looked on with great love and much emotion. The guests from Rome and Leeds were offered wonderful hospitality by Tony’s family and friends; the warmth and generosity of the welcome will live long in the memory.

Fr Tony completes his studies in Rome this summer and then will be appointed to a parish in the diocese of Leeds. Please pray for him and all our priests in their ministry.

Early in the year we hosted the Swiss Guard’s annual retreat, consisting of 42 recruits and existing members.

Each group has its own mother tongue chaplain and facilitator. The Swiss Guard brought a certain amount of precision as one would expect from the Swiss! Lunch began on the dot of 1pm and finished precisely at 2pm. Chillingly, as part of their facilitation they received briefings on responding to possible terrorist attacks. It seems they were highly satisfied with their stay on the shores of Lake Albano as they have just confirmed their booking with us for next year.

### Wedding bells

Palazzola continues to host weddings and this year we have six booked, starting in May and finishing in September.

Weddings fill Palazzola with a wonderful atmosphere of happiness and hope. The look on the guests’ faces as they walk through our doors is priceless, most have never seen this kind of venue before and many are in awe. The special aspect to weddings at Palazzola is the fact that the couple can be married in our beautiful church, have their dream reception here and dance to the early hours with all their family and friends, without any need for taxis or transport. The day after the wedding is also wonderful for family and friends. They stay together and have a chance to catch up and talk with relatives they may not have seen for years. This is just perfect since otherwise couples tend to wave goodbye to their guests at the reception and dash off on their honeymoon.





Most of our weddings are for UK residents but this year we have a couple from Dubai (British) and Thailand, which created lots of bureaucratic problems. However, the couple were intent on having their Catholic wedding with us and so it will be! We also have an American couple from Los Angeles who were looking for just the right kind of Catholic venue for their wedding. Their big day is in August 2016.

Weddings are always a joy and are great for Palazzola as they often bring us new business. Many of our guests, the families and friends of the happy couple enjoy the wedding so much they decide to come back again.

Sadly little has happened in the meantime and the path still awaits remedial works by the local National Parks Association and the Council architectural offices. However it has not discouraged our guests and the students who have devised another route that involves going round the "top field" and the tennis court area to descend onto the path on the far side of the landslide. Hopefully the authorities will address the problem of restoring the path this year.

Tina writes: –
